### From the Village President...

Dear Friends:

The Village's Spring Newsletter gives me an opportunity to share with you highlights from 2012 as featured in my annual State of the Village Address presented to our local Chamber as a Power Point Presentation each January. Following is a summation of its high points:

"As we think about the state of Saukville and its value as a community, it's important to realize that this fine Village is ready to serve its residents, organizations and businesses at all times. While our website address ends in .wi.us, that fact certainly doesn't clearly reflect the opportunities offered through living and working here. By virtue of these offerings, Saukville could easily be described using any of the listed website suffixes. Let's take a look at how Saukville shines in each category listed here ... .gov, .org, .edu, .com, .biz, .info, .net ... but, most of all, .gr8! (And, yes, I made up that last one!)"

"Our Village Board spent a couple of extra evenings together to create a clear vision for sustainable growth of our community; how we'd like that growth to happen and how we can move that growth into reality. With the aid of Nicole Sidoff of the UW Extension, we created a Vision, Mission Statement, and Strategic Priorities for Saukville. The next step was to put Action Steps in place so we have a means to get where we want to go."

"Saukville has reported modest growth in 2012 and, in doing so, has also reconfirmed its Municipal Bond Rating as Aa3 with Moody's Investor Services."

"New to Saukville, Golden Pearl offers adult day services, frail care day services, transportation services, daily living skills and customized programming for those persons needing such care. Golden Pearl is a state-certified facility providing a safe and dignified environment."

"Sass Accounting is a welcome addition to Saukville, not only as far as their services are concerned, but because they completely renovated the interior and exterior of their building. Sass Accounting has been in business since 1993 and provides accounting, payroll and tax preparation services."

"Carroll Converting is a new business to Saukville that boasts of having the most comprehensive collection of disposable wipes in the world. Customers include Clorox, Georgia Pacific and Kimberly-Clark. Their facility in Saukville is only used for developing new cleaning formulas and fabric selections."

"The Tri Par location on the West side of Saukville has been completely rebuilt at an additional value of \$1 million. In this process, they installed a new UST system, built new pumps and now have a new state-of-the-art convenience store."

"C3 Electronix is your place for IT support and computer products. Their goal is to offer amazing customer support and to help with tech problems and questions. They offer a wide range of products and

services to fit all of your computer and electronic needs."

"Mad Max, Inc., owner of various regional convenience stores, has moved their Administration, Corporate Offices and some warehouse space into our Business Park at 725 North Progress Drive."

"Charter Steel was given approval for a \$2 million addition to their rolling mill office building in Saukville. This new space will be used for expanded administrative areas. In addition, Charter received approval for a more modest addition to their plant to store materials for steel melting."

"Johnson Brass has purchased the former Rods & Walers building in our Industrial Park to be used for manufacturing, specifically finished machining using new equipment."

"Jeneil Biotech's expansion includes a 20,000 square foot cooler and 2,500 square feet of additional processing space. Both additions are in the back of their building and are valued at \$2.5 million each. Jeneil's goal with these expansions is to hire ten additional full-time employees."

"And, last but not least, Saukville inspires .net (or networking) ... The Village teamed up with Ozaukee Economic Development to offer a Business Forum event in January. The Ozaukee Humane Society, as a central location, hosted us. Local business leaders were invited to attend to share their insights on doing business in Saukville. The Village provided its new Vision, Mission Statement and Strategic Priorities with the request for ideas from attendees on their potential effectiveness."

"The group that gathered was enthusiastic, shared information and ideas on their businesses as well as thoughts on what Saukville could do to enhance their presence here. All were in favor of making this forum an annual event. They also want to share electronic information so local businesses can learn what is all accomplished here in Saukville and how they can use one another's services. We were thrilled at the success of this venture and look forward to growing it as well as being the conduit for enhanced communication among local businesses."

As you can see, Saukville spent 2012 growing in very diverse and exciting ways. It's always rewarding to reflect on our successes, learn from our failures and see how we can continue to make Saukville gr8!

Please remember to spend a little time this spring picking up the litter and trash that has accumulated under the snow fall. Let's make Saukville a shining star of social responsibility!

## **RUMMAGE & REAL ESTATE SALE SIGNS**

Village Ordinance regarding rummage/garage sale, real estate, directional, or informational signs states that such signs must comply with traffic visibility requirements and are not permitted in Village parks or median areas. Improperly placed signs will be confiscated. Signs shall be erected no more than 24 hours before a rummage sale and taken down no later than 24 hours after. ## **JULY PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS**

All 2012 property taxes not paid by January 31, 2013 must be paid to the Ozaukee County Treasurer. Second installment payments are due to the County Treasurer by July 31, 2013. Make checks payable to the Ozaukee County Treasurer and mail to P.O. Box 994, Port Washington, WI 53074. Village Hall does not accept these payments.



## **VILLAGE'S TRASH & RECYCLING SERVICE PROVIDED BY ADVANCED DISPOSAL (PREVIOUSLY VEOLIA)**

With the renaming of Veolia to Advanced Disposal, all damaged or missing trash and recycling carts requiring replacement will have the new name on them and will be GREY in color. The recycling carts will have a BLUE lid. The carts will be of the same dimension and construction. The same rules apply:



- Roll out carts must be used. Any trash or recyclable materials placed curbside in any container other than the carts will not be collected.
- Collection Day - Thursday (Friday if a holiday falls M-Th of that week).
- Carts must be placed curbside **by 7:00 a.m.** on pick-up day. Carts must face the street as indicated by the arrow, be fully accessible, and be placed side by side with a minimum of three feet of space between carts and/or obstacles.
- Recycle Collection - alternate Thursdays - collection dates can be found on the Village website, Time Warner Cable Access Channel 25, at Village Hall and Oscar Grady Library.
- All recyclables can be placed in the same recycle cart.
- Carts are the property of Advanced Disposal and must remain at the residence should you move.
- Electronic devices, such as computers, monitors, printers, TVs, Fax machines, photocopiers, VCR & DVD players, cannot be disposed of in your household trash cart.
- Large Item Pick-up Service: You must arrange for special pick-up or take items to the drop-off site at 803 North River Road, West Bend. There is a fee for large item disposal. Contact Advanced Disposal directly **(1-800-387-0949)** for prices and information.

### TREE PLANTING

Planting trees is a statement of pride in one's property and provides strong aesthetic appeal to a community. As a Tree City Community, the Village of Saukville strongly encourages the planting of trees on public and private lands. Given the relative long life of most trees, care and thought should go into what species are planted. Consider the dimensions of the lot and the adult size the tree can obtain. Evergreens are a good choice for year round visual screening but species such as Colorado blue spruce will consume a very large area at maturity. Fast growing deciduous species like silver maple and cottonwood can grow to a large size and create a nuisance with seeds or "fuzz". Flowering species like crab or cherry may provide beautiful scents and sights in the spring with their flowers but within a month or two follow up with

fruit that litters the ground and attracts unwanted insects. The best approach to planting a tree is to consult with a local nursery and discuss the options for a particular application or location. There are many hybrids of native species that have been developed specifically for urban settings in terms of adult size, seedless or fruitless varieties, and resistance to insects and disease.



### RESIDUAL DROUGHT EFFECTS ON PLANTS

As spring approaches, residents are reminded that 2012's drought will continue to have lingering effects on trees, shrubs, and perennial foliage. Delayed leaf development, needle drop on evergreens, stunted or reduced growth, and die back may all be manifested, depending on how the weather unfolds in 2013.

## BUSINESS GROWTH & OUTREACH HAPPENING IN SAUKVILLE IN 2013

**SAUKVILLE BUSINESS FORUM:** In January, the Village of Saukville, in partnership with the Ozaukee County Economic Development, hosted a business forum. The program was an opportunity for Village Government and local business to share issues affecting them. ## YARD WASTE (COMPOST) DISPOSAL

How do you get rid of garden waste, leaves, and lawn rakings from your spring yard clean-up? Wisconsin DNR strongly recommends that these materials NOT be placed in the street at any time. Place them in bags, buckets, or other suitable containers and bring them to the compost drop-off site at the Department of Public Works yard.

## CURBSIDE CHIPPING

The Village chipping crew will begin touring the Village **starting April 15<sup>th</sup> and continuing every Monday through October 28<sup>th</sup>** (excluding holiday weeks). Please stack branches (3" maximum diameter) neatly on the parkway (area between the sidewalk and curb), with cut ends facing the street, by 6:30 a.m. on Monday mornings. **DO NOT** place branches on the sidewalk or street. **DO NOT** place branches curbside sooner than the immediate preceding weekend. We **DO NOT** chip tree stumps. The chipping crew is limited to 20 minutes per address, after which a \$25.00 fee is charged for each additional 20 minutes at the property owner's request. We will make only one pass per street side per chipping event. There will be **NO BRUSH DROP-OFF** accepted at the Compost Site.

## DEFECTIVE SIDEWALKS

If you know of any sidewalk section in need of repair, please report it to Village Hall. The Village allocates funds each year to address the priority problems which mostly involve tripping hazards greater than a 3/4" offset. Damage due to street trees is not charged to the homeowner. Most tripping edges are saw cut by a contract service. Sunken sections at a house utility trench are a lower priority and are the homeowners financial responsibility to make repairs.

## HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS MATERIALS DISPOSAL

Household hazardous materials are typically comprised of paints, pesticides, waste fuel, anti-freeze, and typical household cleaners. These materials must **NOT** be placed in the trash. They can be taken to the Ozaukee County Hazardous Waste Collection Site. Fees will be charged on a per pound basis.

**2013 BRANCH CHIPPING**

The Wood Chipper will tour the Village to chip brush/branches ONLY  
**EVERY MONDAY - April 15<sup>th</sup> thru October 28<sup>th</sup>**  
 (no chipping on holiday weeks)

Branches must be curbside by 6:30 a.m. Monday mornings; 3" max. diameter - cut ends facing street  
 No Stumps/No Compost; 20 minute time limit per address applies

Due to the curbside branch chipping collection service, the Village has a surplus of woodchips. Residents can pick up woodchips at the residential yard waste site at 649 S. Main Street. You need to bring a container and a pitch fork or shovel. The Village will deliver woodchips, however, a resident must accept a full truck load (3-5 yards) and the Village will not come back to pick up any unused woodchips.

**2013 LEAF COLLECTION** - October 1<sup>st</sup> thru November 29<sup>th</sup>, as time/weather permit.



## FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING

The Saukville Water Department will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village Monday-Thursday between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. **April 15<sup>th</sup> through April 25<sup>th</sup>**. There may be some discoloration in your water during this process. This is iron and is not harmful. We recommend that you do not do laundry if your water is discolored. If you forget and your clothes have a reddish appearance, **DO NOT DRY THE CLOTHES**; rather rewash in cold water to remove the discoloration. Running the tap for a short period of time will clear the lines after the flushing in your area is completed.



## CROSS CONNECTION CONTROL PROGRAM

The Village's Cross Connection Inspection Program, managed by [Hydro Designs, Inc.](#) (HDI) of New Berlin, has resumed for 2013. A cross connection is a direct or potential connection between any part of the public water supply system and a source of contamination or pollution, i.e.: garden hose, dish washer, toilets, pools, lawn sprinklers. This action is necessary in order to reduce overall costs for compliance with DNR Regulation NR810.15. There is no cost for the inspection. Each inspection takes less than 20 minutes on average for a home inspection and 45 minutes for a business.

HDI will again send postal notices and begin to perform initial inspections of residential, commercial, and industrial buildings throughout the Village to detect actual and potential cross connections and make recommendations for the installation of backflow prevention devices or assemblies where necessary.

## SUMP Pumps

Please remember to check your sump pump and make sure it is hooked up correctly to the discharge lateral and not to the sanitary sewer system. Per Village Ordinance, it is illegal to hook-up or discharge storm water or clear water into the Village's sanitary sewer lines. Since all discharges to the sanitary sewer end up at the treatment plant, this creates additional processing problems of wastewater which is eventually discharged in to the river.

## PAYMENT OPTIONS

To pay your Village water utility bill online, go to the website - [www.officialpayments.com](http://www.officialpayments.com) - click on Local; Wisconsin; Saukville, Village of; utility payment; then enter amount of payment and required information. There is a convenience fee of 2.75% for credit card use and a flat fee of \$2.75 for e-checks. We also offer **automatic withdrawal** from your checking or savings account. Your quarterly payment can be deducted automatically from your selected account on the 25<sup>th</sup> of the billing month, at no additional charge. Go to the Village website (Village Services tab) to download a form to sign up for automatic withdrawal. We can also arrange a payment plan if necessary. Contact Village Hall for more information.

## "SMALL" LEAKS CAN LEAD TO BIG WATER BILLS

"Leaks can account for, on average, 10,000 gallons of water wasted in the home every year - enough to fill a backyard swimming pool."

Each person uses about 80-100 gallons of water per day, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. If you can avoid wasting some of it through common leaks, you can save money while doing something "green" for the environment. Most common leaks are easily repaired. If you're not particularly handy yourself, you can call a plumber - it will be worth the expense in future water use savings.

Here are some tips on finding leaks:

- Check your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, you probably have a leak.
- Place a drop of food coloring in all toilet tanks. If the color shows up in the bowl within 20 minutes without flushing, you have a leak in the tank. Leaks in toilets can double, or even triple, overall water consumption by wasting thousands of gallons a month. Often leaks are silent and go undetected. Check the overflow pipe and plunger ball for leaks and repair and/or replace the necessary parts.
- Check faucet washers and gaskets for wear and replace them when necessary.

## **TORNADO AND SEVERE WEATHER AWARENESS WEEK: APRIL 15 - 19, 2013**

Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week is a good time to go over the plans you have made to ensure the safety of your family when severe weather strikes. Be prepared. **A Statewide Tornado Drill is planned for Thursday, April 18, 2013.** A mock tornado watch will be issued statewide by the National Weather Service at 1:00 p.m. followed by a statewide tornado warning at 1:45 p.m. If there is a threat of severe weather in Wisconsin on Thursday, the drill will be postponed until Friday, April, 19, 2013. The drill will go on in all other conditions including non-severe weather (clouds, rain, dark sky, scattered thunderstorms, etc.). If severe weather occurs on Friday, the drill will be cancelled. The Village will sound the warning sirens for this drill when the tornado warning is received.

As spring turns into summer the Saukville Fire Department would once again like to remind all Village residents to obey Village Ordinances regarding residential burning. Violators may receive a citation and/or bill for fire department services if we respond to complaints of illegal burning.

Residential Burning Ordinances:

§101-17 B(1)(a) Cooking grills designed and sized for normal residential outdoor use will not be permitted to be used or stored above the first story of any building, including on a balcony, raised porch or platform. If you have a grill on a balcony please remove it.

§101-17 B (1)(e) Recreational campfires in a covered or approved container or device requires written permit from the Fire Chief. Permits are available at the Village office during normal business hours. Recreational campfire devices are not allowed on combustible (wooden) decks.
