A LETTER FROM THE VILLAGE PRESIDENT:

Dear Friends,

Summer was a whirlwind of family fun activities in Saukville and I want to personally thank each and every person who helped to make all of them possible. We enjoyed the six "Live at the Triangle" free music nights; having a Farmers' Market on Sundays (which continues through October); a great July 4th celebration; and a very successful National Night Out. For a community of only 4,465, we sure know how to have summer fun.

Now the days are getting shorter ... evenings are cooler ... the kids are back in school ... and we are welcoming the season of fall. Soon the leaves will be changing into a beautiful array of color and we will be wearing jackets more often.

Changes are happening in Saukville as well. U-Haul is gradually moving into the old Piggly Wiggly building and is open for your business. They are offering vehicle rentals in Saukville and will also be offering indoor storage space for rent. U-Haul will be making significant improvements to the façade of the building as well as to the plantings and parking lot. We welcome U-Haul to Saukville and wish them good luck!

River Valley Center is now home to Lakeshore ATA Martial Arts as well as Nine Ladies Dancing Dance Studio. In addition, Mid-City Mart is now a Mobil station. Conservancy Court is home to Seamless Progression Academy Martial Arts and Medical Hearing Associates.

The Village's Plan Commission has given approval for the construction of the revised condominium development off of Briarknoll Court. It is important to have a diverse offering of residential opportunities to foster continued balanced growth.

On the other end of the Village, Engineered Exhaust is completing work on their 62,500 sq. ft. building in our Business Park. They will be bringing about 30 jobs to Saukville. They plan to build exhaust system prototypes at this facility. The building is designed with a blowout wall which will offer them the opportunity for future expansion estimated to be an additional 50,000 sq. ft. of space. This fine company comes to us from New Berlin where they were leasing space. It appears they consider Saukville a place to call home as they own the new facility!

Across the street from Engineered Exhaust, Calibre, Inc., is starting construction of a second building in their corporate campus. This new 94,270 sq. ft. building will be used for administrative services and warehousing. It is anticipated that 80-100 full-time employees will be added in this location.

West of Calibre is the Village's newest Well #6 under construction this year and next. This well will offer us additional high quality water as we continue to grow.

Moving South along Dekora Woods Boulevard, Aisle Logic has added an additional building to their campus on the West side of the street. This 24,000 sq. ft. building is being used for proposed tenants and as a warehouse due to company growth.

The expansion of corporations in any community creates a positive forecast. It is my hope that we can also foster the growth of residential development so the folks taking all of the above new jobs can also live and play here in Saukville.

As far as local government activities are concerned, the Village Board is putting the finishing touches on Saukville's Five-Year Financial Management Plan (working with our accounting firm). This document will provide direction in spending for the future and provide us with a roadmap to help direct decision making. We are excited to be offering this type of forward focused budgeting to our constituents.

Along those same lines, the Village Board will be making its annual tour of the Village and its infrastructure in September. Information learned in this tour will help us with the development of a fiscally responsible 2017 budget for the Village keeping in mind the best interests of all residents and businesses.

In a matter of months, the Village will be rolling out our new website. It will have the same address as the current one but will be easier to use and have a great deal more information at your fingertips. We have been creating this website for a while and are looking forward to its successful launch later this year.

I have always felt that living and working in Saukville is a privilege. We are blessed to have a safe environment in which to grow our families and enjoy our neighbors. We have a hard-working Village staff and management team that are accessible to each of us when we have questions or concerns. Our Police force is second to none in keeping our community free of serious crime and we are grateful for each and every one of them. Our Water and Wastewater staff makes sure our water is provided at the safest level possible and that our wastewater enters the river cleaner than river water. Our Public Works Department tirelessly maintains our streets, trees, grass, snow, etc. Our Fire Department and Emergency Management staff help us when we have serious or traumatic issues. Our fabulous Oscar Grady Library has a great deal of information available to all of us without cost. All of these services are provided locally and are a result of your tax dollars at work. Thank you for that!!

Please remember, you too can run for public office in Saukville and help move our fine community forward. Papers can be taken out on or after December 1st for the offices of Village Trustee (3) and Village President. These are all two-year terms and more than interesting!

DOG AND CAT LICENSE RENEWALS

All Village of Saukville residents owning a cat or dog that is older than six months are required by Village Ordinance to purchase a pet license. 2017 licenses can be purchased at Village Hall beginning December 15, 2016. A late penalty will be imposed for pet license processing after March 31, 2017.

Dog License fees:

\$8.00 spayed/neutered

\$10.00 not spayed/neutered

\$5.00 late penalty after March 31st.

Cat License fees:

\$5.00 spayed/neutered

\$7.00 not spayed/neutered

\$3.00 late penalty after March 31st.

ATTENTION TAXPAYERS

The **full amount, or the first installment**, of your property tax bill is due and payable to the Village of Saukville Treasurer by **January 31, 2017** to avoid any penalties.

Second installment payments are due and payable to the Ozaukee County Treasurer by July 31, 2017.

In order to deduct your property tax payment off of your 2016 income taxes, it **must be paid** by December 31, 2016. Personal property taxes and special assessments included on a property tax bill are due to the Village Treasurer by January 31, 2017 and may **not** be paid in installments.

There is a convenience fee of \$2.75 (transactions less than \$10,000) or \$15.00 (transactions \$10,000 or greater) for using an ACH direct pay checking account. CURBSIDE CHIPPING - EVERY MONDAY THROUGH OCT. 31ST

- 3 inch diameter maximum branches.
- Chipping on Mondays only. The crew will make only one pass per side of the street per chipping event.
- Limit of 20 minutes per address (duplexes considered a single address) after which a \$50 fee will be charged to the property owner for each additional 20 minutes at the owner's request.
- Owner Tree Removal - disposal of all debris, including branches, is the responsibility of the owner.



COMPOST DISPOSAL/APPLIANCE DROP-OFF SITE

OPEN SATURDAYS - 9 A.M. TO 3 P.M. THROUGH NOV. 19TH

- Compost includes garden waste, leaves, lawn rakings and small tree or bush stumps.
- White Goods only - accepted at Appliance Drop-off Site. No Electronics or hazardous items.
- VILLAGE RESIDENTS ONLY.
- NO BRANCHES/BRUSH drop-off at the compost site.

LEAF COLLECTION

- Curbside leaf collection runs **October 3rd through December 2nd** weather permitting. No guaranteed or scheduled pick-up.
- Leaf piles must be curbside with **no brush or plant materials**.
- Keep vehicles off and away from leaf piles.
- Keep piles at a manageable height for the vacuum truck to collect easily.

SNOWPLOW SAFETY

Treat the snowplow crews with courtesy and caution! Keeping clear of their operations allows them to do their job quickly, efficiently, and safely

- Obey the winter parking restrictions.



- Do not park on the street if you see a plow approaching.
- Don't pull out in front of a plow at the last second.
- Keep at least 300 feet of distance from the rear of a plow as it may stop or back up without warning.

CHRISTMAS TREE CHIPPING

Christmas trees will be chipped curbside by the DPW on **Mondays, January 9th & 16th**. The following rules apply:



- Remove all decorations, wire, tinsel, hardware, lights, and stands from tree - no cloth, paper, or plastic cover bags.
- Place trees curbside no sooner than 24 hours prior to the day of chipping and no later than 6:30 a.m. that day.
- In the event of a snowfall, please clear the tree of snow
- Disposal of trees prior to or after the scheduled dates will be the homeowner's responsibility. *Do not put trees out for regular trash pick-up. They will not be picked-up.*

MAILBOX WINTER READINESS

Village plow crews do their best to avoid damaging mailboxes, but it still happens on occasion. It is not the Village's policy to repair damaged mailboxes. In most cases, a strong post and secure mailbox will withstand the impact of snow coming off of the snowplow. Experience has shown that most mailbox damage occurs when the mailbox projects too far into the street or the posts are rotten or weak. Keeping the furthest projection of the mailbox at least two (2) inches behind the back of the concrete curb is recommended. Wood and metal pipe are the only allowable post materials. Brick or concrete posts are **not** allowed, for motorists safety reasons.



Emergency Management - Winter Preparedness

Are you prepared for the cold and snow? Now is the time to review your winter preparedness - before the snow flies...

- Check the contents of your emergency kits, for home and vehicles; replace items that were used or are outdated;
- Check vehicles to ensure they are ready for the abuse winter weather will bring.
- Have your furnace inspected. When was the last time you had the fireplace chimney checked and cleaned?
- Do you have a carbon monoxide detector? When did you last replace the batteries in it or in your smoke detectors?

Review your family emergency plan. Is it up to date; are the contact numbers current; do you have them programmed in all your phones? When was the last time you sat down and reviewed your plan with family members?

Plan your travels and check the latest weather reports to avoid storms. Keep your gas tank near full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines. Carry a winter storm survival kit in your vehicle that includes:

- * Blankets or sleeping bags
- * Flashlight with extra batteries
- * First-Aid Kit
- * Shovel, tools, booster cables, and windshield scraper
- * High-calorie non-perishable food & something to drink
- * Sand or cat litter to use for traction


AS THE SNOW FALLS...

The **Village of Saukville Public Works Department** reminds all Village property owners that resident cooperation is essential to the success of winter snow removal operations.



Residents can help in the following areas:

- **Do not shovel or blow snow into the street.** This creates a hazardous condition for motorists and may require return trips by the snowplow to clear the street. In addition, State Statutes and Village Ordinances prohibit this action and doing so may result in a fine.
- **Shovel snow to the right-hand side of your driveway as you face the street.** This helps to reduce the amount of snow pushed into your driveway by snowplows clearing snow from the street.
- **Utilize your driveway or clear an area along the side of your driveway to safely place your recycling and refuse container.** Maintaining proper clearances, as shown below, will make it safer and easier for collection personnel and automated equipment to efficiently empty your containers.



- **Trash/Recycling Cart Placement:** Cart must be placed with lid opening facing the street and at the back of curb line or street shoulder, with a minimum of 3 feet between cart(s) or other obstructions. Do not place carts beyond the curb line into the street area.
- **Move parked vehicles off of the streets prior to snowfall events.** Parked cars are a hindrance to snow removal operations, requiring more time and costly return trips to effectively clear the streets. Residents are asked to move their vehicles off the street whenever snow accumulations are forecasted.
- **Remove sidewalk snow to the front yard instead of the area between the sidewalk and the curb.** This provides more snow storage capacity between the sidewalk and the curb for snow removed from the street.
- **Keep your mailbox drive-up area accessible for U.S. Mail vehicles.** Please be sure to clear snow from the curb area around your mailbox after a snowfall so that mail vehicles can access your mailbox.
- **Shovel snow from around your fire hydrant.** Please clear snow away from fire hydrants located near your property. This effort helps the Fire Department and the Water Utility to manage the water supply system and to quickly respond to emergencies.

Thank you for your assistance in the success of our winter snow removal operations.



FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING

The Saukville Water Department will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village between 8:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. **October 17th - October 20th & October 24th -**



October 27th. There may be some discoloration in your water during this process. This is iron and is not harmful. We recommend that you do not do laundry if your water is discolored. If you forget and your clothes have a reddish appearance, **DO NOT DRY THE CLOTHES**; rather rewash in cold water to remove the discoloration. Running the tap for a short period of time will clear the lines after the flushing is complete.

WATER BILLS AND WATER LEAKS IN HOMES

Your water bills are determined by Saukville Water Utility staff reading your water meter. When your water bill becomes higher than normal, there is usually a leak in your home. 95% of all leaks are toilets and most times you cannot hear the leak. The toilet most likely to leak is the one rarely used. We recommend that you check your toilets every 6 months to make sure they are not leaking. Place a drop of natural food coloring in the tank - do not flush. Check it in 20 - 30 minutes. If color appears in the bowl, it is leaking water. You can also pick up a complimentary test kit at Village Hall. This is also a good time to operate all of your valves in your home and to start reading your meter weekly to make sure you have no leaks and that you are only billed for the water you use.



IT'S A TOILET, NOT A TRASHCAN—WHAT NOT TO FLUSH

There are only two things that can be safely flushed down the toilet - human waste and toilet paper. Any other item has the potential to clog up the system, regardless of how easily it appears to flush. Unfortunately, many of the items that often end up in the toilet can cause significant clogging problems, not only in your home's plumbing but also for the Village's sewer system and Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) processes. Common items that are often flushed that **SHOULD NOT BE** are:

- Wet Wipes (baby wipes, disinfecting wipes, flushable wipes)
- Facial Tissue
- Feminine Hygiene Products
- Cotton Swabs
- Dental Floss
- Grease



Often these items do not even make it past the lateral connection from your home to the sewer system, building up and clogging the line. If these products make it to the street, they can still plug up and damage the pipes and pumps that convey sewage to the WWTP, potentially causing overflows and basement backups that can be costly to repair. If those products make it to the WWTP, they can also jam up equipment there.

NOTE: Pharmaceuticals and prescription drugs also should never be flushed down the toilet or thrown in the garbage. When put down the drain, pharmaceuticals can seep back into the drinking water supply. Treatment facilities are not designed to remove these contaminants. Local (Saukville P.D.) and County drop-off sites are available to safely dispose of unused/unwanted pharmaceuticals. Contact your local authorities for information and guidelines.

ADOPT A FIRE HYDRANT

Fire hydrants are often overlooked as requiring clearing of snow and ice. Hydrants protect YOUR property. Keeping them accessible will result in saving precious time crucial to firefighters responding to an incident. After extreme amounts of snow, the Utility crews will clear the hydrants as time allows, but you can also help by clearing a hydrant near your home when you clear your driveway and sidewalk after a storm.

COLD WEATHER TIPS - PROTECT YOUR PLUMBING!

All it takes to freeze your pipes is a cold snap that drops the outside temperature below 20 degrees. When water freezes inside a pipe, it creates a blockage that causes pressure to rise. The pressure builds up and the pipe blows. Play it safe and follow some simple tips for keeping water pipes in your home warm and cozy:

- Wrap pipes with foam or fiberglass insulation.
- Seal openings in exterior walls where cold air can get to unprotected pipes.
- Disconnect garden hoses and place insulated covers over outdoor faucets. Better yet, install inside shut-off valves for outdoor faucets and drain water from pipes.
- Leave cabinet doors open to let warmer room air get to the pipes under kitchen and bath sinks.



UTILITY BILLING PAYMENT OPTION

The Village offers a credit card payment option for payment of utility bills. You can pay in person at Village Hall to utilize this service or use a secure link through the Village website (there is a charge for credit card service). Also available is **automatic withdrawal** from your checking or savings account. Your quarterly payment can be deducted automatically from your selected account on the 25th of the billing month. Go to www.village.saukville.wi.us to download the form to sign up for automatic payment. Avoid the hassle of writing checks and worrying about late fees by signing up for auto pay today!

SUMP PUMPS

Remember to check your sump pump and make sure it is hooked up correctly to the discharge lateral and **not** to the sanitary sewer system. Per Village Ordinance, it is illegal to hook-up or discharge storm or clear water into the Village's sanitary sewer lines. Since all discharges to the sanitary sewer end up at the treatment plant, this creates additional problems to properly process the wastewater for eventual discharge to the river.

Cross CONNECTION Inspections Continue

The Village's Cross Connection Inspection Program, managed by Hydro Corp Inc., will continue for 2016-2017. A cross connection is a direct or potential connection between any part of the public water supply system and a source of contamination or pollution, i.e.: garden hose, dish washer, toilets, pools, lawn sprinklers. This action is necessary in order to reduce overall costs for compliance with DNR Regulation NR810.15. Hydro Corp will be contacting homeowners and businesses to arrange an inspection. There is no cost for this inspection. Each inspection takes less than 20 minutes on average for a home inspection and 45 minutes for a business.



VILLAGE'S TRASH & RECYCLING SERVICE

- Roll out trash and recycle carts are provided to residential households by **Advanced Disposal - 800-387-0949**.
- Trash Collection - every Thursday (Friday when a holiday falls M-Th that week)
- Carts must be placed curbside **by 7:00 a.m.** on pick-up day. Carts must face the street as indicated by the arrow, be fully accessible, and be placed with a minimum of three feet of space between carts and/or obstacles.
- Recycle Collection - alternate Thursdays - collection dates can be found on the Village website, Time Warner Cable Access Channel 25, at Village Hall, and at Oscar Grady Library.
- All recyclable materials can be placed in the same recycle cart.
- Any trash or recyclable materials placed curbside in any container other than the carts will not be collected.
- Carts are the property of Advanced Disposal and must remain at the residence should you move.
- If you experience damage to your cart, please call Advanced Disposal for repair or replacement.
- **The 2017 trash/recycling collection fee will be \$181 per residential unit. This fee will be added to your 2016 Property Taxes as a separate line item.**
