Please know your Village team, having excellent management leadership, is keeping up-to-date on all health-related matters as well as keeping all of our community resources safe and functional. For the health and safety of our staff and the public, please avoid any non-essential visits to Village facilities. We encourage on-line resources and call-in services which are easily available to all.

The Village has recently become home to A Place to Be Spiritually Center (an ecumenical ministry of St. John XXIII Catholic Parish). They are located in the Parkside United Church of Christ building at 166 West Dekora Street. Their hours are: Monday-Thursday 10:00 a.m.-6:30 p.m. and additional times by appointment. Their Mission: *A Place to Be* accompanies those who seek meaning and purpose and something beyond themselves.

At this time in our lives, A Place to Be will continue to hold regular business hours and are available to support you in any way they can. Please do not hesitate to reach out to them with any needs, even if you just crave a listening ear. They have built some incredible relationships with people and organizations throughout our communities and, if they cannot provide you with what you need, they can certainly help you find a path that can.

A Place to Be, as well as Village, staff suggests and encourages everyone to consider those in your lives who may be most vulnerable and check in with them. Those who are out of work or do not have the option to stay home, the elderly who rely on various programs for sustenance and socialization, children who are out of school and parents struggling with childcare, and all of those with already compromised immune systems will all need more community support during this difficult time. Additionally, food pantries, meals on wheels, schools, churches, and other organizations may be in need of extra donations and volunteers to keep up with the increased demand. Let's work together to make sure no one falls through the cracks as we all adjust to this new reality.

Usually, I use this Spring Newsletter to give a report on my State of the Village presentation regarding last year's happenings and growth. Well, this year, said speech has been postponed to date. I will instead share general positive news of our awesome community, Saukville.

The Village Plan Commission approved a new business for Saukville at 460 East Green Bay Avenue. Midwest Martial Arts commenced operations, I believe, the day after their approval. Please, if you have an interest, stop in and welcome them to our community once it is safe to do so.

The Village Plan Commission also recently approved a Starbucks for the site which formerly held the Mobil Station directly in front of Walmart (827 East Green Bay Avenue). Building is going to happen over a 4-5 month period and is scheduled to begin in spring. I personally love the diversity of offerings we can share among ourselves and with our many visitors.

As explained in an open meeting on February 11, 2020, the 99 acres north of Piggly Wiggly is scheduled for development in earnest in 2020 and, should that be the case, the Village will have a new, exciting, and successful area - "Destination Saukville" - in which to live, work, and play.

This unique destination is unlike anything else in the region. Destination Saukville will feature indoor and outdoor recreational and athletic opportunities for residents of all ages and promises to quickly become the destination of choice for health and wellness activities. Value added to Saukville is between \$65 million and \$80 million upon completion. It is estimated that this build out will generate between \$1.25 and \$1.5 million annually in property taxes.

Saukville is one of the first pioneers of the Solar Now Pilot Program. All equipment for this Fix-Tilt System is provided by WEC Energy Group. It will be located to the West of the water tower off of Dekora Woods Boulevard. Estimated annual income to the Village is \$21,000 over a 20-year period. Installation is expected to begin this spring and will take approximately two months.

We have welcomed Ruan Trucking to Saukville. This fine company is a new carrier for Charter Steel. Charter Steel chose Ruan as their transportation partner to support Charter's customers, plants, and suppliers throughout the Midwest, East Coast, and Mid-Atlantic regions of the U.S. Ruan began local operations on July 1, 2019. As a result Ruan is employing 100 new drivers.

As of this writing, we still anticipate voting to take place at the American Legion Hall on Tuesday, April 7th. Please make sure to make your wishes known by sharing in this American privilege. Locally, there are four people running for three Village Trustee seats.

RUMMAGE & REAL ESTATE SALE SIGNS

Village Ordinance regarding rummage/garage sale,
real estate, directional, or informational signs states
that such signs must comply with traffic visibility re-
quirements and are not permitted in Village parks or median areas.
Improperly placed signs will be confiscated. Signs shall be erected
no more than 24 hours before a rummage sale and taken down no
later than 24 hours after. For more information, contact Village

OUTDOOR FIRE PITS AND STOVES

Do you like to enjoy outdoor fires in the summer?
Did you know that you need a permit to open burn in
the Village of Saukville?



Open Burn Permits can be obtained at Village Hall for a one-time
\$20 permit fee. Permanent in-ground pits require approval from
the Fire Chief before installation. Permit applications can be found
on the Village website (Our Government/Building Permits, Inspec-
tions & Applications).

2ND INSTALLMENT PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS

All 2019 property taxes not paid by January 31, 2020
must be paid to the Ozaukee County Treasurer. Sec-
ond installment payments are due to the County Treasurer **by July**
31, 2020. Make checks payable to the Ozaukee County Treasurer
and mail to P.O. Box 994, Port Washington, WI 53074, or pay at
Port Washington State Bank, Saukville Branch, after July 1st.
Village Hall can not accept or process second installment pay-
ments.

YARD WASTE (COMPOST) DISPOSAL

How do you get rid of garden waste, leaves, and lawn rakings from your spring yard clean-up? Wisconsin DNR strongly recommends that these materials NOT be placed in the street at any time.



DPW does NOT collect spring clean-up yard debris street side. You must containerize debris and bring to the compost drop-off site during Saturday open hours. This site is open to Village residents only. Also, you can help prevent plugged storm sewers by making sure catch basins near your property are clear of debris.

CURBSIDE CHIPPING

The Village chipper will tour the Village on **Mondays, April 6th through November 2nd**, (excluding holiday weeks).

Please observe the curbside requirements on the DPW Services page (next). Please also note:

- DO NOT place branches curbside sooner than the immediately preceding weekend. We DO NOT chip tree stumps.
- The chipping crew is limited to 20 minutes per address, after which a \$50.00 fee is charged for each additional 20 minutes at the property owner's request.
- We will make only one pass per street side per chipping event.
- BRANCHES ARE NOT accepted at the Compost Site.
- **The property owner/occupant is responsible for removal/disposal of limbs larger than 3" diameter, and for full tree removal including cut branches resulting from tree removal process.**
- **Residents can pick up chippings at the DPW site or have a minimum truck load delivered. Call the DPW office (284-0545) to make arrangement.**

DEFECTIVE SIDEWALKS

If you know of any sidewalk section in need of repair, please report it to Village Hall. The Village allocates funds each year to address the priority problems which mostly involve tripping hazards greater than a 3/4" offset. Damage due to street trees is not charged to the homeowner. Most tripping edges are saw cut by a contract service. Sunken sections at a house utility trench are a lower priority and are the homeowners financial responsibility to make repairs. Contact the DPW for more information.

MAIL BOX POSTS - REPAIR OR REPLACE BEFORE WINTER

If you have a weak or rotting mail box post, this is the time to change it so it is stable for winter. In most cases, a strong post and secure mailbox will withstand the impact of snow coming from a snowplow. Most plow damage occurs when the mailbox projects too far into the street or the post is weak or rotten. Keeping the mailbox projection at least 2 inches behind the back of the concrete curb is recommended. Wood and metal pipe are the only allowable post materials. Brick or concrete posts are **not** allowed for motorists safety reasons.

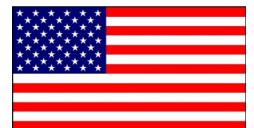

How to Display the American Flag

Here are few basic guidelines to keep in mind based on the U.S. Flag Code:



- Always make sure the flag never touches the ground or anything below it.
- Do not display the American flag in inclement weather, unless it's an all-weather flag.
- If you want to fly the flag after sunset, keep it well lit.
- When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the Union (blue section) should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, the flag should be displayed in the same way, with the Union to the left of the observer's view.
- No other flag or pennant should be placed above, or, if on the same level, to the right of the American flag.

Wondering what you should do when your flag becomes worn and no longer suited for public display? The U.S. flag code requires it to be disposed of respectfully, preferably by burning. Many local VFW posts and American Legions hold ceremonies to retire flags. Saukville Legion Post 470 has a drop box outside the Legion hall to drop your flags for proper disposal. Contact them at 262-284-2787 with questions.

2020 BRANCH CHIPPING

The Wood Chipper will tour the Village to Chip Brush/Branches ONLY
EVERY MONDAY – April 6th thru November 2nd
(No Chipping During Holiday Weeks)

- Branches must be curbside by 6:30 a.m. Monday mornings; 3” max. diameter - cut ends facing street.
- No Stumps/No Compost; 20-minute time limit per address applies.
- Per Village Ordinance 187-21, the property owner or occupant is responsible for disposal of entire tree and all branches as a result of tree removal. This will not be chipped by Village chipper.

Due to the curbside branch chipping collection service, the Village DPW has a surplus of woodchips.

- Residents can pick up woodchips at the DPW yard waste site at 649 S. Main St. during site hours on Saturdays.
- Bring your own containers and pitch fork/shovel – tools and containers are not provided.
- The DPW will deliver only full truck loads (3-5 yards) of chips to residential addresses upon request. We do not come back to pick up any unused woodchips. Call the DPW at 284-0545 to arrange delivery.

How Do I Dispose of...???

How often have you cleaned out the basement or garage and found yourself looking at items you didn't know what to do with - old appliances and furniture, TVs, tires, auto batteries, waste oil - to name a few? The local waste hauler will not accept many of these items. Don't despair; there are still means available to dispose of this stuff, although a small fee may be required.



White Goods - Drop-off site located at the Village of Saukville DPW, 649 S. Main Street. Available Saturdays only during regular Compost Site schedule. Village residents only. Drop off unwanted white goods - air conditioners, dehumidifiers, dishwashers, washers/dryers, microwaves, ovens/ranges/stoves, refrigerators, freezers, & water heaters. No home pick-up is available.

Furniture, bedding, household items - if clean and in good shape, resale stores - St. Vincent de Paul or Goodwill - may accept the items. If not hazardous materials/electronic and fits, these items can go in your trash cart. Or, arrange for a special pickup with Advanced Disposal (800-387-0949) or haul to their site at 803 North River Road, West Bend. Advanced Disposal will charge a disposal fee.

⇒ **The Village of Saukville provides a clean-up dumpster each spring** - last two Saturdays of April and the first Saturday of May for furniture and household items (no electronics or hazardous items). Village residents only. Limitations apply.

Rechargeable tool and cell phone batteries (Ni-Cad, Nickel Metal Hydride) . Saukville Police Dept. accepts many of these batteries. Call 262-284-0444 for info.

Recycling, Electronics, Scrap Metals - Ozaukee Iron & Metal, LLC - 728 Schmitz Drive, Port Washington
Accepts furniture, mattresses, carpet, Freon units, some appliances and electronics, household batteries, tires, and more.
Fees may apply. Buys certain electronic scrap and scrap metals. Call 262-284-4060 for complete list and fee info.

Household Hazardous Waste & Electronics – kitchen and bathroom, garage and workshop, home and garden products, some electronics – can be taken to the Ozaukee Co. Hazardous Waste Collection Site (Veolia ES Technical Solutions LLC) at 1275 Mineral Springs Drive., Port Washington. This site is open on Mondays only. Call 262-243-8998 for more information.

Waste Oil - County Highway Dept. drop-off site at 410 Spring Street, Port Washington (284-8331). Some of the local automotive service centers will also take it. OIL CANNOT BE CONTAMINATED WITH ANTI-FREEZE, SOLVENTS, OR OTHER VOLATILE FLUIDS.

Untreated, clean lumber - cut up and place in cart or burn in fire place or wood stove. Remove nails or hardware.

Treated lumber, railroad ties, and lumber containing creosote - call waste hauler such as Advanced Disposal to arrange for dumpster or pickup. Fees apply.

Tires - local automotive service centers. Most will charge a nominal fee.

Clothing and other apparel - Contact local churches or charities that accept donations, or St. Vincent de Paul or Goodwill stores.

Remember... Dumping oil, anti-freeze, solvents, cleaners, paint, fuel, and other solids or liquids in storm sewers is ILLEGAL and can lead to substantial fines and jail time.

TRASH-RECYCLING SERVICES PROVIDED BY ADVANCED DISPOSAL

Trash and Recycling **collection day** for the Village of Saukville is **Thursday** - Friday on weeks when a Federally-recognized holiday falls between Monday-Thursday and all municipal facilities are also closed. The following rules apply:

- Roll-out carts must be used. Any trash or recyclables placed curbside in any container other than the carts will not be collected.
- Carts must be placed curbside **by 7:00 a.m.** on pick-up day.
- Carts must face the street as indicated by the arrow, be fully accessible, and be placed side by side with a minimum of three feet of space between carts and/or obstacles.
- Recycle Collection - alternate Thursdays - collection dates can be found on the Village website, Time Warner Cable Access Channel 25, at Village Hall and Oscar Grady Library.
- All recyclables can be placed in the same recycle cart.
- Carts are the property of Advanced Disposal and must remain at the property should you move.
- Electronic devices, such as computers, monitors, printers, TVs, Fax machines, photocopiers, VCR & DVD players, cannot be disposed of in your household trash cart.
- Large Item Pick-up Service: You can arrange for special pick-up or take items to the *drop-off site at 803 North River Road, West Bend*. There is a fee for large item disposal. Contact Advanced Disposal directly (800-387-0949) for prices and information.
- **Contact Advanced Disposal for repair of cart damage. You must contact them directly at 800-387-0949.**

FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING - 2020

The Saukville Water Department will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village Monday-Thursday, **April 27th - 30th and May 4th - 7th** between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Any discoloration in your water is iron and is not harmful. Running your faucets for a short period of time after flushing in your area is complete will clear the lines. If discoloration occurs, we recommend that you do not do laundry. If you do laundry and your clothes have a reddish appearance, **DO NOT DRY THE CLOTHES**; rather rewash in cold water to remove the discoloration.



CROSS CONNECTION CONTROL PROGRAM

The Village's Cross Connection Control Inspection Program, managed by HydroCorp Inc. (HCI), is continuing in 2020. A cross connection is a direct or potential connection between any part of the public water supply system and a source of contamination or pollution, i.e.: garden hose, dish washer, toilets, pools, lawn sprinklers. This inspection action is necessary in order to reduce overall costs for compliance with DNR Regulation NR810.15. HydroCorp will be contacting homeowners and businesses to arrange for an inspection. There is no cost for the inspection. Each inspection takes less than 20 minutes on average for a home and 45 minutes for a business.

PAYMENT OPTIONS

Online Option: Via link on the Village website or at www.officialpayments.com - click on Local; Wisconsin; Saukville, Village of; utility payment; then enter amount of payment and required information. There is a convenience fee of 2.75% for credit card use and a flat fee of \$2.75 for e-checks.



Automatic Withdrawal from Checking or Savings Account:

Your quarterly payment can be deducted automatically from your selected account on the payment due date at no additional charge. Go to the Village website (Village Services tab) to download a form to sign up for automatic withdrawal. A payment plan can also be arranged if necessary. Contact Village Hall for more info.

"SMALL" LEAKS CAN LEAD TO BIG WATER BILLS

"Leaks can account for, on average, 10,000 gallons of water wasted in the home every year - enough to fill a backyard swimming pool." (source: U.S. Environmental Protection Agency)



Each person uses about 80-100 gallons of water per day, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. If you can avoid wasting some of it through common leaks, you can save money while doing something "green" for the environment. Most common leaks are easily repaired. If you're not particularly handy yourself, you can call a plumber - it will be worth the expense in future water use savings.

Here are some tips on finding leaks:

- Check your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, you probably have a leak.
- Place a drop of food coloring in all toilet tanks. If the color bleeds into the bowl within 20 minutes without flushing, you have a leak in the tank. Leaks in toilets can double, or even triple, overall water consumption by wasting thousands of gallons a month. Leak detection kits are available at Village Hall.

PLEASE NOTE: Know where your main shut-off valves are in your residence or business and exercise them at least quarterly - they are your responsibility. There are usually two valves, typically located one above the meter and one below. Exercising them will allow you to turn off your water quickly in the event of a water emergency.

SIREN TESTING

The Village warning siren system is tested at 1:00 p.m. the first Friday of each month from April to November, weather conditions permitting. These tests are conducted in order to ensure that the system is ready to go when severe weather arises.

TORNADO & SEVERE WEATHER AWARENESS WEEK

APRIL 13 - 17, 2020

According to the National Weather Service, Wisconsin averages 23 tornadoes annually, with most occurring in the 3 - 9 p.m. time frame. The peak tornado season is May through August, with June having the greatest number of tornadoes.

A Statewide Tornado Drill is planned for Thursday, April 16th.

A mock tornado watch will be issued statewide by the National Weather Service at 1:00 p.m. followed by two statewide tornado warnings at 1:45 and 6:45 p.m. If there is a threat of severe weather

in Wisconsin on Thursday, the drill will be postponed or cancelled. The drill will go on in all other conditions including non-severe weather (clouds, rain, dark sky, scattered thunderstorms, etc.). Wireless emergency alerts and other weather apps will not tone/push notify. Please reserve this time to practice your own tornado and severe weather safety plans.

SPRING FLOODING

As the snow and ice melt and spring rains drench our area, rivers, creeks, and wetlands may rise and overflow their banks flooding roads and recreation areas. Flood waters can carry hidden and dangerous debris beneath the surface, as well as be contaminated with road grime. Wading into or driving through flooded areas is extremely dangerous. Just a little running water can sweep a person or a full sized vehicle away. **Please avoid flooded areas...**

It takes very little running water to sweep a person or a full sized vehicle away. The road beneath any water, running or still, could be damaged or gone. Motor vehicles stalled in flood waters leave occupants trapped in a very hazardous situation. Swift water rescues are extremely dangerous for both the citizens, and the first responders. **Please avoid flooded areas... TURN AROUND - DON'T DROWN.**

RECREATIONAL BURNING

As spring turns into summer the Saukville Fire Department would once again like to remind all Village residents to obey Village Ordinances regarding residential recreational burning. Violators may receive a citation and/or bill for fire department services if we respond to complaints of illegal burning.

Residential Burning Ordinances:

§101-17 B(1)(a) Cooking grills designed and sized for normal residential outdoor use will not be permitted to be used or stored above the first story of any building, including on a balcony, raised porch or platform. If you have a grill on a balcony please remove it. §101-17 B (1)(e) Recreational campfires in a covered or approved container or device requires written permit from the Fire Chief. Permits are available at the Village office during normal business hours. Recreational campfire devices are not allowed on combustible (wooden) decks. In-ground fire pits must be pre-approved by the Fire Chief.

Open Burn Permits can be obtained at Village Hall for a \$20 lifetime fee. Permit applications can be found on the Village Website under the 'Our Government' tab.
